Dues for 2019

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A Moment in Irish History

A Brief History of The AOH in Orange County

Today, the Orange County Irish have a great reputation, our clubs are known all over New York State, and in the case of the Gaelic Cultural Society of my hometown, Greenwood Lake, all over the USA and the world. But it wasn't always the case.

AOH Historian extraordinaire Jim Kelly did a history of the AOH in Orange County in the Division One 25th Anniversary Journal in 1994. In that piece, Jimmy traced the history of the AOH and found at the turn of the century, there were AOH Divisions in Monroe, Middletown, Highland Falls, Port Jervis, and Newburgh. In the aftermath of WW 1 & 2, these Divisions faded away. I grew up in the 60's and 70's and for most of my early years in Orange County, there was a lack of any Irish presence. But the winds of change soon were on the horizon. A generation of first- and second-generation Irish were, as Jimmy put it, packing up their tea kettles and looking north to Orange County. The family of Joseph Duell, Jr. was one of the many who settled here, in the neighborhood known as Worley Heights. Other families settled in Chester, Monroe, Warwick, Greenwood Lake, Washingtonville, etc., villages that have quick access to New York City, where many earned their living as members of the NYPD, FDNY, MTA, et al.

The year was 1968, the Vietnam War was raging. Military Service was mandatory. Many in our country refused to serve and took to protest and burning their draft cards or fled to Canada to avoid Nam, but young Joe Duell was not one of them, and he signed up for the Army. Sadly, Joe lost his life after being in Vietnam only two months after he arrived, in June, 1968. Joe's mom, Helen, was the first in a line of Irish who served as Supervisor of Blooming Grove.

To honor the memory of Joe, a group of men who had migrated from New York City to Orange County, founded Division One in 1969. By this action, a positive wave was started. The death of Joe was the catalyst for the rebirth of the Irish Community here. By the late 70's, four Irish clubs had been formed and were flourishing, Along with Division One, there was the Middletown Irish (1973), the Gaelic Cultural Society (1975), and The Friendly Sons & Daughters of Goshen (which was founded in the home of the late Paul O'Dwyer.) All these clubs started having all kinds of events to honor our Irish Heritage, such as the annual St. Patrick's Dances, Bagpipe lessons, and Irish Step Dancing. The year following the American Bi-Centennial in 1976, there was a movement started by the Middletown Irish American Society to start an annual parade to honor St. Patrick, our patron saint as well as the patron saint of our Archdiocese of New York. By tradition, all Archbishops of NY have been of Irish descent.

Once the wave started, there was no holding back. Today we have dances, the Mid-Hudson St. Patrick's Parade (now in the 43rd year), two vibrant step dancing groups, festivals, concerts, several Men's and Ladies' AOH Divisions, and a Gaelic Football Club (St. Brendan's). A program started by the Greenwood Lake Gaelic Cultural Society in 1975, by our Brother Denis Mulcahy, Project Children, brought Catholic and Protestant children to America for a respite from the Troubles in Northern Ireland. Ironically, the Troubles in the North reignited in 1969. In my personal opinion, there would not have been a Good Friday Agreement in 1998, if it was not for Project Children. In recognition of his work as Chairman, Denis Mulcahy was awarded the highest national AOH Honor, the JFK Award at the recent National AOH Convention this past year.

Yes, there is much to celebrate today here in Orange County. Again, my personal opinion is the tragic loss of Joe Duell, and the foundation of Division One to honor Joe's sacrifice, are the reasons we are where we are today.
